#### **Opening of the Meeting**

Julie Francis called the JJCC Executive Subcommittee meeting to order at 2:11 p.m. Motion to approve April 20, 2022 meeting minutes, as written, all in favor Motion by James Tillman and seconded by Julie Francis

• Currently working on a design for signage for ARISE facility to replace the outside HDJDAC sign.

We are also discussing changing the unit names so it doesn't sound like they are in a detention center

## **Program Update**

- Pine Grove Working on a contract with the state, we are proposing we have 10 beds. Prior to DJJ closing they were a program that gave high school education and trained to be forest fire fighters. Effective next year, Pine Grove is being taken over by CDCR. The new criteria is age requirement of 18, you now have to have a HS diploma or GED, at least 6 months up to 72 months left on their commitment and a mental health and physical screening. The goal is to train them to be fire fighters, they can then transition from this program to Community Supervision or California Conservation Corp
- Riverside County has an MOU to go before there board on August 2<sup>nd</sup>, there is no financial component to it, but should we need to use each other to transfer youth to a different county for whatever reason, we will have bed space as an option. Ex.:
  - o Safety (co-parts need to be separated)
  - o Low female population
  - o Assault on staff
- We continue to have tours by the District Attorney's, Public Defenders and Judges, but we also have
  had tours by the State (OYCR) and multiple counties. OYCR is so impressed they are now
  considering our department as the state model and using us as an example for other counties
- We were asked to be a part of a panel at the upcoming CPPCA conference on September 6<sup>th</sup>, this will be an opportunity to discuss our program and give the other counties opportunities to ask questions
- We've been able to bring in college and vocational training that will help shape our youths future when they transition out. As of today we already have 13 youth in college classes, and by next month it will be 19 which is a majority of the facility with an average GPA of 3.7. We have 3 different colleges and a 4th in place to obtain their Bachelor's Degree
  - o Victor Valley physically comes on campus for college and vocational education
  - o Mission and Coastline are completed virtually
  - o Coastline offers dual enrollment (youth in high school and college at the same time)
  - o All colleges provide counselors
- JJRBG follow up, next plan will be due May 2023. Come the end of this calendar year, we will need
  to start early or have more meetings after the end of this year in order to update our plan. This will
  also have to go before the BOS before it goes to state
  - Discussion on the plan to keep youth in juvenile system Julie Peterson reached out with preliminary numbers for the previous years:
    - 2019 11 youth sent to adult court and 32 remained in juvenile court
    - 2020 6 youth sent to adult court and 29 remained in juvenile court
    - 2021 13 youth sent to adult court and 47 remained in juvenile court
    - Totals 30 adult and 108 juvenile (about 30%)
  - o This is an opportunity to articulate when reporting to the state, that we already have low numbers and the reality is we will not be able to get it to zero

## Discussion of Phase II

- Voting to rename Phase II, we solicited youth at ARISE and staff (handouts provided for voting)
  - o Group voted on SOAR (12 votes)
- Discussion on ideas for SOAR, it is their step down, and they will be in a non-secured place. They can lock doors and leave when the want to (just like if they were at home). This is a place for them to come home to and sleep. The length of stay is determined by court
- Ideas for SOAR programming
  - We want to offer services to them when they first arrive, they need an opportunity to get a job or go to school
  - We are hoping to set them up with mentors, to help them succeed as young adults
  - o Teach them how to use transportation (Bus pass, Uber, Lyft)
  - o Offer individual and family therapy to help them work on communication
  - o Teach them how to budget normal living cost, restitution and parent-hood. We can assist with cost in the beginning but teach them how support themselves
  - Possible RFP for housing in case they are out of time and have no family to return to, or if they are not ready to transition home. We also do not want them going into the housing for our homeless population, so we are creating a separate RFP
