New Business

Legislation / Commitment Language:

- Clean up legislation still pending in regards to Senate Bill 823 (SB92)
 - o There are questions regarding the process that needs clarification
- Workgroup should have wording available for review by next meeting to review/discuss
- Will need to address youth committed to Secured Youth Treatment Facility
 - Currently youth are returned to Court every six months for review to determine if youth will stay in SYTF or be released to less secure facility
 - Former Gateway location will be used for this purpose, but is not expected until Phase 2 of program
 - Workgroup will need to work of flow chart procedures
 - Per Judge Dvorak goal is to release youth to less secure location would like to keep review system similar to current DJJ process

- Per Cannady In-person Court appearances are helpful and allows opportunity for family involvement
- Possible Court appearances
 - 1st Review, Hybrid (In-Person or Video)
 - 2nd Review, dependent on sentence, could be Non-Appearance
 - 3rd Review, release from program, could be In-Person
 - Give authority to allow for non-appearance

Annual Plan – Training Plan - Orientation Handbook

- Currently working on Annual Plan will have document ready in two weeks to review/discuss
- Currently working on Training Plan for Staff
- Currently working on Case Plan for Youth and Orientation Handbook

Release for Information

- Opened on April 1 and will close on April 20
 - Three responses received via email informed vendors they must enter information into County E-Pro system
 - o Probation fiscal staff will create list of vendors, which will be provided to committee
 - o If committee members are aware of agencies in the community or non-profits that may have a suitable program, please inform them to submit interest through E-Pro

Education

- Youth currently committed to DJJ were surveyed in regards to vocational training and college courses
 - Primary Choice for Degree was in Music; Other choices were Fire, Technology, Criminal Justice, Journalism and Sociology
 - o Vocational Training Visual Arts, Automotive/Body Repair
- Mobile Welding School vehicle can be brought facility
- Victor Valley College offers training on HVAC and Electric Solar Power
- VVC vendor build tiny homes that will be used for Victorville homeless youth attending college

Facility:

- Youth will be unable to control water temperature, only turn on/off water
- Painting is ongoing
- Flooring has been confirmed
- Furnishings have been ordered more home-like feel
- Currently youth eat in Day Rooms a long dining table will be purchased for separate dining area
- Working with DBH on Mental Health Services and offering a room conducive to group sessions
 - o More therapeutic atmosphere where staff can meet with youth
 - o Being mindful of colors and lighting
 - o Discussion of therapeutic garden
- Approved vendor prior to closing of HDJDAC regarding Dog Program in facility therapeutic and teaches responsibility

DBH:

- Per Carpenter Staff will be hired as positions become available
- List of equity trainings, which may include cultural competence, discrimination, LBGOT etc.
