Overview

This memorandum accompanies the Community Corrections Partnership Funding Request Form. The funding request is to pay for the services of RC Johnson Consulting to make three enhancements to our current case management system. The remaining cost of such enhancements is not to exceed \$800,000.

Program/Service Description AND Need for the Program

The Department is the public prosecutor mandated to prosecute crimes committed within San Bernardino County (County) under Government Code 26500. Law enforcement agencies submit crime reports and investigative information to the Department for review and potential prosecution. The Department submits cases electronically to the Superior Court to start the prosecution process.

In the Fall of 2021, the Department implemented its new Case Management System, STAR: TNG, which has significantly increased work efficiency and allowed more seamless data sharing with the Superior Court and defense attorneys representing criminal defendants. There, however, are three areas of improvement that must be made to enhance these efficiencies further and comply with state laws that have been promulgated AFTER the creation of the system.

The areas that need modification are as follows:

1. Compliance with Penal Code section 741.

Effective January 2024, PC 741 will require District Attorneys to develop, implement, and execute a race-blind charging system for cases reviewed by their offices. PC 741 requires redaction of race-identifying information before the initial "blind" review of a case to determine if charges will be filed. A second, unredacted review of the case information must be performed, and again, it must be determined if charges will be filed. If the decision to file charges differs between the initial "blind" review of cases and the second, complete review of case information, the differences must be documented with a justification and reported as required by State law. This unfunded state mandate must be operational by January 1, 2025. At present, no such capability exists in our system.

2. Data connections with law enforcement agencies.

During the spring of 2023, the Department began implementing a new and temporary electronic portal to STAR: TNG for police agencies to submit cases to the Department for review to determine charges to be filed to the Superior Court. Because each agency's business processes differ, the portal must be configured to navigate the nuances between agencies. The new portal became mission-critical technology during the recent ransomware attack on a law enforcement agency. The old legacy portal had to be inactivated because of the damage caused by the ransomware attack. While a temporary portal has been initiated, it has placed significant strain on all our law enforcement partners by requiring them to type data in multiple times, which makes it susceptible to error. For this reason, docking connections with each police agency is necessary to create even greater work efficiencies within the Law and Justice partners.

Included in this development is the need to coordinate the case management system with the District Attorney's digital repository to ensure that digital material.

3. Data sharing between the District Attorney and Probation Department.

In our close working relationship with the Probation Department, we learned of many efficiencies that can be gained through collaborative working on the delivery and ingestion of materials directly to and from the Probation Department without the need

to make paper copies. Items include, but are not limited to, the following:

- a. Material to the Probation Department
 - a. Police Reports
 - b. Motions filed in court.
 - c. Complaint filings
 - d. Information filings
 - e. Plea agreements
 - f. Restitution information
- b. Material to the District Attorney: Probation pre-sentencing reports
 - a. Petitions to violate probation
 - b. Miscellaneous memoranda related to probationers
 - c. Memoranda related to treatment court progress

Through our discussions with Probation management, we learned that materials provided by the Probation Department often will not make it to our case files for one reason or another, in time for court appearances. We've also learned that materials sent to the Probation Department often get lost in sending, which further delays the work of our probation officers who work under court deadlines. By creating this portal connection, we can reduce this, reducing the number of court appearances defendants must attend.

The High Desert is an under-served region in terms of proactive rehabilitative programs. The lack of treatment resources is a barrier to successful completion of probation, a significant cause of a recidivism rate, and results in return to prison commitment.

The request to fund MAP programming (including this request for a leased facility in the City of Victorville to house the program) offers the best opportunity to reduce recidivism and prison commitment rates in this region.

A successful data analytics initiative will provide a clear picture of where the programming is performing and will determine if any services need to be adjusted. Criminal Justice Research has documented treatment with "high-fidelity" program implementation has a positive effect on outcomes, such as reduced recidivism, and "low fidelity" program participants showed no change or higher recidivism rate. The Probation Department Programming & Research unit will generate data reports monthly in order to perform the required analytics.

The new vehicles will serve as mobile operation centers to take services to isolated clients and maintain vital supervision contacts. In situations of disruption to normal operations, failure to appear for scheduled probation appointments is highly increased. Services will also include assisting isolated reentry clients with mobile check-in, and triage treatments, as well as distribution of clothing and personal hygiene items. Additionally, the vehicles will, in an emergency, be available for use as mobile command posts.

Does this request produce any measurable results? (For example: cost savings, enhanced productivity, improved services, etc.) **Please describe:**

A mobile command vehicle (MCV) is a large self-supported vehicle based on a recreational or commercial vehicle design that provides workspace, auxiliary power, communications, and other mission-critical facilities when needed in the field. This strategy will help to reduce probation revocations of the reentry population, which is measurable.

Incremental differences in the data on probation revocations in situations of operational disruption (County Emergency), can be measured against a baseline of historical performance metrics on recidivism reduction under similar conditions.
