Health Education and Promotion (Title 15, Section 1415)

712.1 PURPOSE:

To ensure health education is accessible for youth in the Juvenile Detention and Assessment Centers (JDACs) and Treatment Facilities (TFs) to promote healthy lifestyles regarding health, wellness, and recovery information.

712.2 DEFINITIONS:

<u>Health Education</u>: Information on preventing illness, promoting self-care for an existing health condition, and maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

<u>Self-care:</u> Care for a condition that can be addressed by the youth and may include over-thecounter medications.

<u>Individual Educator</u>: Correctional Nurse/Licensed Vocational Nurse designated to provide specific health education to youth for conditions such as acute, chronic, prenatal, and postpartum.

712.3 GUIDELINES:

- A. Health education programs shall be interactive, age, gender, and developmentally appropriate.
- B. Brochures and pamphlets on a variety of health topics shall be accessible to all youth throughout the clinic and intake areas.
- C. Health education may be conducted in small group settings as appropriate.
- D. The education program shall be updated as necessary to address health priorities and meet the needs of youth.

712.4 RESPONSIBILITIES:

- I. Health Service Manager (HSM):
 - A. Collaborate with local universities to develop Memorandums of Understanding (MOU's), which allow student nurses to provide health education to youth in the JDACs/TFs.
 - B. Oversee health education activities in the JDACs/Treatment Facilities.
- II. <u>Supervising Correctional Nurse I/II:</u>
 - A. Designate a Correctional Nurse and/or Licensed Vocational Nurse as an Individual Educator to provide specific health education.
- III. Correctional Nurse I/II, Licensed Vocational Nurse (LVN), Clinic Assistant:

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- A. Provide health education during encounters with youth such as intake processing, sick-call rounds, and clinic settings and document in the health record.
- B. Refer to Forensic Adolescent Services Team (FAST) Alcohol and Other Drug Counselors (AODs) for individual drug and alcohol education needs.
- IV. FAST Alcohol and Other Drug Counselors (AOD's):
 - A. Review all referrals for AOD services only.
 - B. Screen and review youth that are referred.
 - C. Provide individual education and counseling on specific AOD needs.
 - D. Inform youth of in-custody 12-step program, when applicable.
 - E. Serve as a liaison to local Juvenile Drug Court for those youth who are or may be detained.
 - F. Provide a list of community resources upon release of those youth previously referred.
 - G. When assigned to a Treatment Facility:
 - 1. Conduct AOD Group Facilitation and Individual Sessions.
 - 2. Perform AOD Group Curriculum Implementation and Development.
 - 3. Provide Relapse Prevention Preparation and Education and Aftercare Services as necessary.
